#### **Presentations**

After the greeting, the group watched a slide show consisting of pictures submitted by the membership since the last issue of the Meridian. Pizza and beverages were served to make up for the missing of the traditional October dinner meeting.

The aforementioned pictures were then shown individually and described by the member responsible for the submission. #### **Member Spotlight**

My Early Days in Astronomy by Mike Dannenfeldt

I heard about astronomy and my mind started to think about it at a young age. I got started back in the early 60's, at 12 yrs. old. At that time I lived on Davenport Ave. off Locust St. in Davenport. Sometimes things are meant to happen, a block away I knew this Chiropractor by the name of Dr. Neiswander who I found out was very into Astronomy. He invited me to his home on Jersey Ridge & 46th St. I was absolutely amazed at the size of his telescope. It was a 12" reflector which now is at the Menke roll off roof observatory. As a youngster, I felt like I connected up with the right person. It was the first time that I saw the moon close up, Jupiter and its moons, Saturn, and M 42. I was impressed to say the least!

At that time I saved money up from my grass mowing and snow shoveling jobs to purchase a 6 " reflector. My Dad even constructed a small 8 ' square fold out roof observatory for my 6" scope. I currently own an 11" Celestron with a Hyper Star.

I continued to search out more local people involved in astronomy & clubs. In my search for a club I ran across the Popular Astronomy Club that met on the Augustana College campus once a month. Dr. Harry Nelson, professor of Mathematics, was president of the club. He had an interesting topic every month; he made you think about astronomy to expand your mind, great speaker! The club had an annual potluck every August at the Carl Gable Observatory off Coal Town Rd. in Moline. It was equipped with a very long Refractor. I remember that most of the time it seemed like I hung out with people that were always older than me, as an only child growing up, I grew up with adults anyway, so I always seemed to adapt well, and never afraid to speak up to add to my knowledge.

At about 14 yrs. old, 1965, I discovered the St. Ambrose on campus observatory on the NE corner of their property. It was about a block west of the intersection of Lombard and Harrison. I was curious to find out what was inside this Observatory, I called St. Ambrose and they made a connection with Monsignor Menke. Then one night we met at the observatory and low and behold Dr. Neiswander had donated his 12 " reflector to the college that I had my first look threw just a couple of yrs. earlier. Small world I guess. So at the end of the evening Monsignor Menke said, the interest I showed and what I had learned he felt like I should have a key to use the observatory. He also told me to feel free to bring people to show off the universe. The dome on the observatory back then is now the same dome that is out at Dixon , IA where the St. Ambrose observatory is now located .

I feel like one of my biggest observations and lucky to be there at the time, was back in Oct. of 1965. It was a comet named Ikeya-Seki that graced our skies. It was a bright comet that streaked way across the southern fall sky, night after night that Oct. Other neat things I have been fortunate to witness is the transits of Venus & Mercury. When I witnessed this it goes to show you just how small we really are as these planets slowly move across the face of our sun. I find Astronomy is a great mind exerciser too!

That is my story on how I got started in Astronomy!




